20 THE PARTOȘ MONASTERY

The Partoș Monastery and the Church of the Holy Archangels Michael and Gabriel. A living place of Orthodox pilgrimage, deeply rooted in local faith and tradition.

22 DETA

A charming small town on the Timiș Plain, a true hidden gem full of surprises for visitors. With welcoming accommodations, delicious local cuisine, and a summer open-air swimming area, perfect for cooling off and relaxing. It's an ideal stop for cyclists exploring the region.

21 THE BANLOC MANSION

Built in the 18th century, it was the residence of the local landlords. It was known for its notable garden with rare tree species, and its owner, who loved to travel, even created a small Egyptian museum where, according to rumor, even a mummy was displayed. The turbulent period following the establishment of the communist dictatorship left its mark on the condition of the castle.

23 SAINT GEORGE MONASTERY

Saint George Monastery is a medieval Serbian Orthodox monastery located in Mănăstire. It is one of the main monuments of Serbian culture in the Romanian Banat. The iconostasis is sumptuous, gilded, the interior decoration being representative of the Serbian Baroque.

24 VRȘAC - THE FORTRESS TOWER

The Vrșac Tower is one of the most recognizable landmarks in the region, standing proudly above the town and vineyards of Vrșac. Built in the 15th century, the medieval fortress offers panoramic views of the Banat plain and surrounding countryside. Today, the tower is a popular destination for visitors seeking history, nature, and scenic hiking trails.

1 TRIPLEX CONFINIUM

Three nations, one monument, countless stories. This is the place where you can spin in a circle and "visit" Hungary, Serbia, and Romania in under five seconds — just don't let border control see you doing it.

2 TRIBUTE TO ODŌN TĒRY

Born in Beba Veche, he was a pioneering figure in the early development of hiking and tourism in Central Europe, significantly contributing to making outdoor exploration more accessible and organized — basically turning "getting lost" into a planned adventure.

3 BÉLA BARTÓK IN SĂNNICOLAU MARE

One of the most influential composers of the 20th century, Béla Bartók was a pioneer of modern music. He blended the raw beauty of Eastern European musical folklore with bold innovative sounds and collected thousands of traditional melodies preserving invaluable cultural treasures.

4 PEDAL PAST THE PAST AT NAKO CASTLE

An emblematic gem of Sănnicolau Mare, the castle was built in the second half of the 19th century, mixing eclectic style with a hint of romantic flair. Once the proud estate of the Nako family, it now serves as the cultural heartbeat of the town. A perfect stop to stretch your legs—and maybe your imagination.

5 THE MAMMOTH OF KIKINDA

Located in the heart of Kikinda, the National Museum features six departments and is home to one of the world's best-preserved mammoth skeletons — Kika, a 90% complete Steppic Mammoth. Visitors can explore exhibitions, enjoy a 3D mammoth film, rent bikes, and join the annual Mammoth Fest held each September.

6 MEMORIAL SITE IN LUNGA

Lunga, the gateway to Romania on EuroVelo 13, the Iron Curtain Trail, was, during the communist regime, one of the starting points for those brave enough to attempt to escape in search of a better life. Here, a rest stop dedicated to cyclists has been set up—a place for reflection and a landmark of collective memory that honors the sacrifices made in the name of freedom.

7 THE STORYTELLING PARK IN COMLOSU MARE

The village honours its notable residents with commemorative plaques, including those who ventured to the New World. One of them gained a touch of notoriety in Chicago — proof that even quiet villages can have scandalous surprises.

8 NIKOLAUS LENUA MEMORIAL HOUSE AND LOCAL HISTORY MUSEUM LENUAHEIM

Mileva, the Duchess of San Marco, once a generous patron and guardian of the local community, remains a respected figure in the region's history. Though her once-elegant mansion stands only as a shadow of its former self, its surviving architectural details quietly recall a more graceful era — before the decline brought by the communist period.

9 THE TRAIN STATION IN JIMBOLIA

Jimboia station is home to hundreds of years of history. If you pass through the Jimboia train station, you will receive a first-class ticket for timetravelling. The course of life has changed destinies here, and history has set in motion events whose echoes can still be felt.

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10 TOUR OF THE LOCAL MUSEUMS

Beyond the objects themselves, Jimboia's six museums preserve the lived experience accumulated over the past four centuries. Each artifact tells a tale, offering a deep and personal insight into the community's cultural heritage, making the town not just a destination, but a journey through time and memory.

10 CHECEA THE BORDER VILLAGE

A quiet border village with a soothing vibe — its central park offers a peaceful pause on a cycling route. Amidst the gentle stillness stand Serbian, Romanian, and Croatian churches, silent witnesses to a rich cultural tapestry woven through time.

11 THE MAUSOLEUM BOBDA

The ruins of the mausoleum, modeled after the Esztergom Basilica, tell a story of shifting regimes and the rise and fall of local figures. A quiet reminder of a turbulent past.

12 MONUMENT OF SAVA VUKOVICI BERGSAU MARE

A modest monument in the churchyard is honoring multicultural heritage and political courage. Sebő (Sava) Vukovics, a Hungarian statesman of Serbian descent, played a key role in the 1848 Revolution — a defining chapter in the nation's fight for independence. As Minister of Justice, he stood at the crossroads of reform.

13 OBELISK FOR THE FIRST PAVED ROAD IN BANAT

Before 1835, Banat's roads were so bad that people joked they just threw mud on more mud and called it a road. In summer, dust choked travelers; in autumn and winter, carts sank into the mire. This road was a breakthrough — literally paving the way forward. A small step for local infrastructure, a giant leap for the region.

14 TIMIȘOARA HAS REVOLUTION IN ITS BLOOD

And it paid with blood for its rebel DNA. This city radiates freedom. It cannot be ruled, but it can be loved. It is charming and addictive. Always ahead of its time or against it, marches at its own pace. It has been a shelter and an outpost, a home and a fortress, a cradle and a final resting place. It is the sum of all and the mirror of each.

15 IN THE FLOW OF CENTURIES SĂNNIHAU ROMĂN

Built over a century ago, this historic lock is the gatekeeper of the Bega Canal — making sure boats (and spirits) flow smoothly between Romania and Serbia. Whether you're cruising by boat or cycling along the scenic Bega Canal bike path, it's the perfect spot to pause, soak in some history, and maybe snap a few photos! Nearby, you'll find plenty of spots to relax, eat, and drink — ideal for recharging before your next adventure.

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16 WINDOWS OF HOPE OTELEC

Built from local bricks, this symbolic wall stands as a tribute to those who lived - and suffered - under the Iron Curtain, which once divided Europe into East and West. It is a powerful reminder of lost freedom, regained hope, and the quiet strength of solidarity in difficult times. Named Windows of Hope, this is not just a wall — it's a window into the past - and a promise for the future.

17 THE NEOLITHIC SANCTUARY PARTA

The museum in Parța contains a replica of a Neolithic sanctuary dating back over 6,000 years, discovered on the banks of the Timiș River in the 1970s. It is an interactive space, designed as a living house, where visitors can understand the way of life and daily activities of Neolithic people.

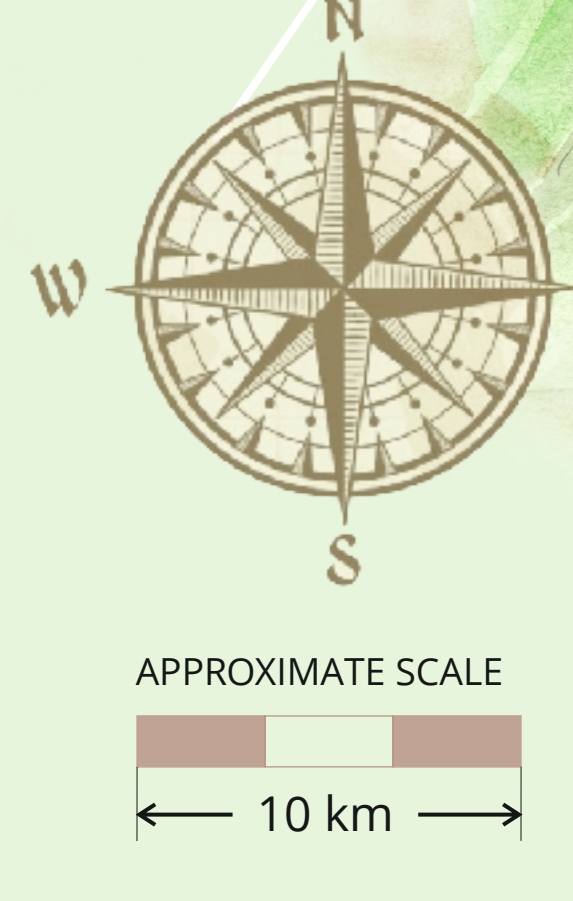
18 THE MOCIONI MANOR FOENI

Built in the 18th century, the manor was one of the residences of the notable Mocioni family, a prominent landowning dynasty in the Banat region. Today, it serves as an educational center, where an insightful exhibition offers a glimpse into the lives of the region's former noble families.

19 DOSITEI OBRADOVICI MEMORIAL HOUSE CIACOVA

It stands out for its undeniable cultural and historical value. It is the birthplace of one of the most influential figures of 18th-century Serbian society — Dositei Obradović, a renowned monk, writer, and Enlightenment thinker who left a lasting mark on Serbian culture through his writings and actions. Fortified tower — The Medieval Tower of Ciacova is a former defensive structure and one of the oldest landmarks in the region.
